Variations is an exhibition curated by Michael Camakaris. He has made a selection of artworks from four artists.



Michael Camakaris is an artist from Arts Project Australia. His practice includes drawing, painting, collage, printmaking and ceramics.

Michael was chosen for the first Blindside 2021 Artist Mentorship program.



The program pairs up an early-career artist who has a disability with employees from Blindside gallery.

Now the exhibition will be shown in real life at Arts Project Australia's Collingwood Yards gallery, 1 - 30 October

#### **Exhibition information**



Michael asks the question, "what is art?"



Google suggests, to understand our world better, to inspire others, to better humankind and to increase empathy in others.



Michael wonders how this is possible when a large amount of of artists represented in galleries are white, ablebodied men.



Due to the lack of different artists shown in galleries, Michael has chosen to promote artists with lived experience of disability.

## **Exhibition information**



This exhibition is promoting artists who are different from the norm and this is why the exhibition is titled "Variations".



Michael wants to highlight himself as someone who identifies as having a disability.



He thinks this is important because he is someone from the disability community supporting other member of the same community.



Michael believes it is important the artists have a choice in what artworks are chosen and how they are exhibited. This is because artists from these communities are not always given a choice.

## **Exhibition information**



The most important part of this show, is to shine a light on a community that are often not seen. Michael believes this can enrich our lives.



Some of the themes from the work in the exhibition are the body and the environment it inhabits, the use of words and references to art history.

#### **Artist information**



Jordan Dymke is an APA artist who often explores body image in his artwork. In Jordan's artwork, Vitruvian Man II he challenges this view of perfection.

Also included in the exhibition are paintings of his hands and a ceramic torso, which have become symbols for his disability.



Mark Smith is an APA artist who often create words in different materials like soft sculpture and ceramics. Many of the words relate to life with a disability and how Mark fits in with society.

Mark's disability has helped him develop his style. Due to his lack of coordination, Mark creates a distinctive thumbprint on his ceramic works.

### **Artist information**



Kieren Seymour is a Melbourne-based artist who creates art using many different materials and methods.


He uses his art to explore his lived experience as someone with autism.
