

Spring1883 is back - but different this year.

Emerging from Melbourne's fifth lockdown and heeding the restrictions lingering behind, the seventh edition Spring steps out of one building to spread itself across Melbourne.


En route across the satellite booths (full program coming soon), find Arts Project Australia presenting an immersive installation of five artists, the collection aptly titled *Spring Back*.

Where, if not the grand Windsor Hotel? In the spirit of the last eighteen-months' proximity to home, APA sets up next door to the Collingwood Yards's gallery at the soon-to-be home of the ILBIJERRI Theatre Company.

Spring Back exhibits recent works by five artists pushing their practice and creating work with strong thematic depth. Ruth Howard's luscious collection of organic ceramic stacks alongside the verdant canvases and ceramics of Georgia Szmerling; multidisciplinary artist Chris Mason's immersive installation of paintings, ceramics and miniature sculptures of large women and snakes, contrasting with Mark Smith'sceramic and fabric words, then juxtaposed with Julian Martin's sublime abstract pastel drawings.

Following your visit, continue to the APA gallery next door to see Material World: a multi-dimensional exhibition on until Sunday 22 August.



Georgia Szmerling's multi-disciplinary practice includes ceramics, painting and drawing, with a dominant interest in the portrayal of the natural world. Rich in texture and highly expressive, Szmerling's wild plant formations often suggest a sense of lyrical movement, while the artist's abstract, whimsical ceramic creatures exude a tender, dream-like charm.

Georgia Szmerling has been a regular studio artist at Arts Project Australia since 2003 and had her first solo exhibition at Lupa, Melbourne in 2005. She has exhibited in numerous group shows at Arts Project Australia and at other galleries across Australia including Spring 1883, The Establishment, Sydney; 'Melbourne Art Fair', Royal Exhibition Building, Melbourne; 'Classic Albums', Tanks Art Centre, Cairns; 'Renegades: Outsider Art', National touring exhibition (2013 – 14); 'BSG Works on paper prize', Brunswick Street Gallery, Melbourne; 'Group Show', Chapter House Lane, Melbourne; 'Small Universe', No Vacancy Gallery, Melbourne and the 'Darebin Art Prize 2015', Bundoora Homestead Art Centre, Melbourne.

Ruth Howard is a multi-disciplinary artist working in small scale in the mediums of painting and ceramics. Howard's minimalist paintings often portray a single object on a flat plane, while her sculptures depict wild animals or organic matter in abstract form – from amphibians to insects, elephants and porcupines. Her dedication to this theme has enabled her to refine her idiosyncratic, bold style to quirky levels of elegance and beauty. Her ceramic creatures and sculptures appear as if newly formed directly from the earth or sea. The detailed surface texture and glaze combination further add to the dynamic nature of these works.

Howard has worked in the Arts Project studio since 1998, and held her first solo show at Arts Project Australia in 2015. She has been included in numerous group exhibitions including Spring 1883, The Establishment, Sydney; *Turning the Page*, Gallery 101, Ontario, Canada; Hybrid Making – new work from Australia, Canada and Scotland, Project Ability Gallery, Scotland; and Face-Up, Idiom Studio, Wellington, New Zealand.

Chris Mason is an accomplished multidisciplinary artist whose practice stems from extensive research. Working with media including painting, drawing, sculpture, and ceramics, Mason depicts subjects as diverse as trains, aircraft, snakes and voluptuous women. Both idiosyncratic and humorous, Mason's works are often inspired by photographs and images that he collects online.

Chris Mason has been a regular studio artist at Arts Project Australia since 1997. He has presented three solo exhibitions, two at Arts Project Australia, Melbourne (2002, 2007), and at Darren Knight Gallery, Sydney (2014). He has exhibited in numerous group exhibitions at Spring 1883, Sydney; Museum of Old and New Art (MONA), Hobart; Artspace, Sydney; West Space, Melbourne; Fleisher/Ollman Gallery, Philadelphia; and Linden New Art, Melbourne. His work is held in private collections including the National Gallery of Australia, Canberra; State Library of Victoria, Melbourne; and National Gallery of Victoria, Melbourne.



Mark Smith is a figurative multidisciplinary artist who works across painting, ceramics, mixed media, video and soft sculpture. Working with emotion as a starting point, he is concerned with how the body relates to human nature and the human condition. He considers the body a non-negotiable starting point for existence.

Smith has worked in the Arts Project studio since 2007 and had his first solo exhibition in 2017. He has exhibited in numerous group exhibitions including Spring 1883, Robin Gibson Gallery, No Vacancy Gallery, c3 Contemporary and the Substation. His work is held in the Monash University Museum of Art and Moreland City Council collections and is held in private collections throughout Australia.

Characterised by their rich surfaces, Julian Martin's pastel works make a unique visual statement. Methodical in his approach, he carefully works from photographs and arranged still life, deconstructing these references to create highly considered compositions. With his pastels evoking a strong bodily resonance, his work is a continuous reinterpretation and response to form.

Martin has worked at Arts Project Australia since 1988 and has held multiple solo shows at Arts Project Australia (2001, 2003, and 2014) as well as Australian Galleries (1995), Manningham Gallery (2009) and No Vacancy Gallery (2015). He has also been included in numerous group exhibitions including The Armory Show and Outsider Art Fair, Fleisher/Ollman Booth, New York; Spring 1883, Melbourne and Sydney; Museum of New and Old Art, Hobart; Mornington Peninsula Regional Gallery; and National Gallery of Victoria, Melbourne. In 1994, Martin was a finalist in the Moët & Chandon Travelling Fellowship and, in 2014, won First Prize in *Connected*. His work is held in numerous collections including the City of Melbourne, Monash University Museum of Art and National Gallery of Victoria, as gifted by Stuart Purves. He is currently represented by Fleisher/Ollman, Philadelphia and Arts Project Australia.




