### **President's Report**

### Tiffany Lucas

It is an incredible honour to serve as President of Arts Project Australia, having stepped into the role in November 2024. This marks my first year as President, and I want to warmly thank my predecessor, Virginia Lovett, for her years of dedicated service, strong advocacy, and unwavering belief in Arts Project's vision.

The end of 2024 concluded our year-long celebrations of our 50th anniversary. This amazing milestone marked five decades of APA championing neurodivergent artists and creating meaningful and high-profile opportunities for their work to be seen, valued and collected. From the moving reception hosted by the Governor of Victoria at Government House, to the critically acclaimed *Intimate Imaginaries* exhibition at TarraWarra Museum of Art, it was a year filled with moments amplifying just how far we have come and signaling the strength of our future.

In January 2025, the APA Foundation welcomed Virginia Lovett into her new role as Chair of the Foundation. We also welcomed three new members to the Foundation Board over the past year - Shyara Fernando, Ross Coller and Fiona Evans. The Foundation plays a key role in securing long-term financial sustainability and expanding our impact for years to come.

It's a true privilege to serve an organisation as impactful and inspiring as Arts Project Australia, and I'd like to sincerely thank my fellow APA Board members for their time, dedication, and the wealth of skills they bring to the Board. We extend our thanks to Sheryl Bates who stepped down from the Board in May 2025, her thoughtful contributions have been deeply valued.

Arts Project Australia remains a creative force powered by its community – our artists, staff, volunteers, donors, and supporters. I'm incredibly proud of what we have achieved together over the past year and excited for what lies ahead.

It continues to be a great privilege to lead Arts Project Australia, an organisation with a proud 50-year legacy of championing neurodivergent artists and artists with intellectual disabilities. In 2025, the Board endorsed a new Strategic Plan that both honours our past and strengthens our vision for the future: that neurodivergent artists are boldly shaping the future of contemporary art. It's a vision that has quietly underpinned our work for decades and is grounded in the belief that our artists create exceptional work, offer powerful ways of seeing the world, and deserve far greater visibility and recognition.

In 2024/25, we concluded our 50th anniversary celebrations with a series of major milestones: a landmark hardcover publication, a joyous and celebratory reception at Government House, and the exhibition *Intimate Imaginaries* at TarraWarra Museum of Art. Featuring over 160 works by 13 APA artists, *Intimate Imaginaries* stands as, to my mind, the first major museum exhibition in Australia to centre the practices of neurodivergent artists.

Our artists' growing national and international profiles were recognised through major opportunities, including the first of many collaborations with Food For Everyone; Miles Howard-Wilks' inclusion in the 36th Ljubljana Biennale of Graphic Art, curated by internationally renowned curator Chus Martinez; the Northcote Penguins being awarded the Grimwade Creative Fellowship, which culminated in the creation and presentation of new work at Buxton Contemporary; and Terry Williams being named a finalist in the prestigious Wynne Prize at the Art Gallery of New South Wales. These achievements, among so many others, are a testament to the extraordinary talent found right here in our studio.

It has also been a delight to represent APA across the contemporary art sector and to witness the depth of connection so many people feel toward our artists and their work. As I continue to introduce colleagues and peers to the organisation, I am never surprised by the warmth and enthusiasm of their response.

As we look to the future, I remain energised by the creativity and generosity of our artists, the dedication of our team, and the continued support of our community. Each and every one of you makes APA the extraordinary organisation it is.



### **Bendable Realities**

As part of APA's annual creative program, prominent curators are invited to curate an exhibition that places APA artists alongside their peers; leading national and international contemporary artists.

This initiative seeks to make broader connections with curators, artists, galleries, and museums, making visible the calibre of the work produced by APA artists, and exemplifying their place within the contemporary art landscape. Since its inception, the initiative has resulted in a long list of remarkable exhibitions that have served to generate new partnerships and develop and strengthen relationships.

Bendable Realities paid tribute to this initiative in APA's 50th year. Past curators were invited to select artworks by both APA artists and external artists, creating a dialogue between them. The exhibition celebrated the power of collaboration and meaningful connections, highlighting the gradual reimagining of the art world as a more open, adaptive, and inclusive space for diverse perspectives, experiences, and identities.

50 Birds celebrated the joint 50th anniversary of two iconic organisations, Arts Project Australia and Arts Access Victoria (AAV).

Annual Gala Devoted To You



Metropolis

The future city—a speculative urban metropolis shaped by science and technology—was a widely explored theme during the twentieth century. However, very few of these megacities ever came to fruition, and even fewer of those realised models were successful. Although certain elements of the metropolis have actualised and continue into the current day, looking back upon the concept of the future city, there are numerous disconnects between what was proposed and what came to be.

The works in *Metropolis* responded to the fantasy modernist city as a multifaceted site upon which various narratives and emotions have been projected, while also exploring the relationship of those models to the present.

### The Fall of Icarus

The Fall of Icarus was an ambitious new solo exhibition by Michael Camakaris, exploring the cycles of power, collapse, and consequence. Drawing from cultural references such as Greek mythology, the poetry of Sylvia Plath, and Danny Boyle's sci-fi thriller film Sunshine, this immersive, multi-disciplinary installation dissected the perils of excess and pride in the contemporary moment.

At its core, the myth of Icarus—a timeless warning against unchecked arrogance. In his reimagining, Camakaris transformed this allegory into a meditation on the rise and fall of empires, past and present. Through sound, light, video, and sculptural installation, *The Fall of Icarus* exposed the fragility of economic, environmental, and political systems, revealing the patterns of excess and decline that shape our world today.







#### **Professional Development Opportunities**

There were many highlights, celebrations and opportunities for the artists during our 50th year, none more so than the landmark exhibition Intimate Imaginaries at TarraWarra Museum of Art. Exhibiting artists Georgia Szmerling and Lisa Reid delivered artist talks during it's presentation, engaging a diverse audience that included APA donors, Victorian College of the Arts Secondary School students, and contemporary art curators.

In the Northcote Project Space two APA artists curated exhibitions. Suzanne Barnes worked with staff artist Anna-Maria O'Keeffe to present Joy Abounds, a solo show of Suzanne's work. The opening event featured a boot scooting session with special guests Lu and Kitty from Disco Rodeo Boot Scooting with artists and staff joining in and echoing Suzanne's passion for dance that informs her practice.

Oscar Donati co-curated Figures From Life, which celebrated over a decade of life drawing by APA artists. The show highlighted the originality, technical skill and expressive virtuosity of this dedicated group of artists who attend the in house life drawing sessions each term. Oscar opened the exhibition with a thoughtful and moving speech, drawing a powerful connection between the study of the human body in all its wondrous diversity and the inclusive, celebratory spirit that defines our community of artists.

Oscar was also the fifth studio artist to complete a paid studio traineeship in the studio, bringing the same careful attention to detail and precision that defines their art practice.

#### **Innovation in practice**

Melbourne artist Tobias Titz began a collaboration with our artists on a unique photo project using a long-exposure Polaroid camera. Each silver tone portrait is paired with an etched response, scratched by the artist into an unexposed plate. The process has provided yet another way for the artists to explore and build their own creative practice through collaboration and interaction with the broader arts landscape.

#### Residencies and fellowships

Lisa Reid was the seventh APA artist to complete a residency at the Australian Tapestry Workshop (ATW) in South Melbourne. APA began a partnership with ATW in 2017 providing APA artists with the opportunity to work alongside other creatives, including ATW's renowned weavers, in an environment that fosters excellence and innovation.

Mark invited students from Monash, RMIT, and VCA to explore the themes of "translations" and "perspectives" through varied mediums and lived experiences.

#### Workshops and field trips

The studio provided opportunities for artists to develop their creative practices through a variety of workshops and field trips. Artists worked with the creatives at Words Worst Wagga, whose textile workshops make the art and craft of wagga quilting accessible, inclusive, and fun, emphasising the joy of collaboration. The workshop was a perfect fit for our artists, many of whom continue to explore and express their creative voices through textile practices.

Local artist Brendan Huntley delivered two dynamic workshops, bringing his signature spirit of experimentation and play to artists working across ceramics and printmaking. His sessions encouraged bold exploration, bringing fresh creative ways of approaching ceramic processes.


Our printmaking staff artists Yoshe Gillespie and Carolyn Hawkins delivered chine collé workshops for the artists demonstrating the versality of techniques that this process offers.

In March seven APA artists, accompanied by staff artists, Suzie Brown and Shell Odgers spent three days at an artist's retreat at The Old Hospital in Loch, South Gippsland. Amongst the activity undertaken was a pigment-making workshop led by local painter Lucy Hersey, who guided artists through the process of creating pigments from natural materials, and an En Plein Air painting session at The Gurdies Nature Reserve. The artists found the experience very rewarding and fun and we hope to incorporate this residency into our annual program, so that more APA artists have the chance to experience this incredible opportunity.

# Fundraising & Philanthropy

#### **APA Foundation**

In the past year the APA Foundation has continued to provide valuable guidance and input into the Development Strategy, Gift Acceptance Policy and the stewardship of donors. Virginia Lovett stepped into the role of Chair in January 2025 (to replace Tiffany Lucas, now APA Board President) and we welcomed three new members: Shyara Fernando, Ross Coller and Fiona Evans. Norman Rosenblatt and Renee Wallace both stepped down from the APA Foundation in 2024/25 and we thank them for their contribution.

#### **APA Creatives**

This year the APA Creatives program has continued to grow, with donors gathering regularly throughout the year to enjoy the art from our studio. Highlights have included a guided tour of *Intimate Imaginaries* with curator Anthony Fitzpatrick, followed by a long lunch at TarraWarra Estate in February. APA Creatives have also enjoyed morning teas with artists at the studio to celebrate the quarterly exhibitions in the Northcote foyer space and special curator talks before exhibition openings at our Collingwood Yards gallery. Many APA Creatives renew their annual gifts in May/June and our total gifts from individuals for 2024/25 was \$104,000.

#### **ARTX50 Annual Fundraiser**

In celebration of our 50th year, we held our annual fundraiser ARTX50 in the stunning new rooms of Leonard Joel Melbourne auction house on 16 October 2024. Long-term APA supporter and Leonard Joel Managing Director John Albrecht generously hosted us for the evening and led an exciting auction of key works from the stockroom which raised \$27,545 in artwork sales. 140 guests on the night were thrilled to see 60% of every artwork sold paid to artists, and record prices achieved for Simon Paredes, Lisa Reid and Chris O'Brien. The night generated a further \$18,100 income in ticket sales, and donations of \$13,500.


